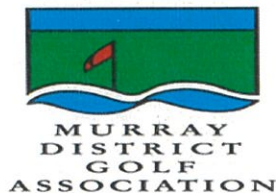

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

1 Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The directors have prepared the financial statements on the basis that the company is a non reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. The financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the needs of members.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies disclosed below which the directors have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of these statements are as follows:

Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, property, plant and equipment, intangible assets and investments are reviewed to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If there is an indication of possible impairment, the recoverable amount of any affected asset (or group of related assets) is estimated and compared with its carrying amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and the present value of the asset's future cash flows discounted at the expected rate of return. If the estimated recoverable amount is lower, the carrying amount is reduced to its estimated recoverable amount and an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables are recognised initially at the transaction price (i.e. cost) and are subsequently measured at cost less provision for impairment. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the carrying amount of trade and other receivables are reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that the amounts are not recoverable. If so, an impairment loss is recognised immediately in income statement.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Revenue recognition relating to the provision of services is determined with reference to the stage of completion of the transaction at the end of the reporting period and where outcome of the contract can be estimated reliably. Stage of completion is determined with reference to the services performed to date as a percentage of total anticipated services to be performed. Where the outcome cannot be estimated reliably, revenue is recognised only to the extent that related expenditure is recoverable.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF MURRAY DISTRICT GOLF ASSOCIATION LIMITED

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Murray District Golf Association Limited, which comprises the balance sheet statement of financial position as at 30 June 2022 the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the director's declaration of Murray District Golf Association Limited ("MDGA").

In our opinion, the accompanying financial report of Murray District Golf Association Limited is in accordance with the *Corporations Act 2001*, including:

- (a) Giving a true and fair view of the Company's financial position as at 30 June 2022 and of its financial performance for the year then ended; and
- (b) Complying with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012, Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013 and the *Corporations Regulations 2001*.

Basis for Opinion

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgement, were of most significance in our audit of the financial report of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial report as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. The key audit matter concerns the recording of grant income in the appropriate accounting period.

Responsibilities of the Directors for the Financial Report

The directors of the MDGA are responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and the *Corporations Act 2001* and for such internal control as the directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the directors are responsible for assessing the MDGA's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the MDGA or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, or to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of this financial report.

As part of an audit in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

Juniors Report 2022

During 2022 The MDGA combined with Golf NSW and Jack Newton Junior Golf to hold numerous junior competitions for all ages and abilities.

It all started back in February with Encourage Shield between Thurgoona, Corowa and The MDGA Junior All Stars. In a thrilling final at Albury between Thurgoona and Corowa. Corowa won to advance to the next round. They travelled to Yass in October and played against Goulburn Golf Club losing 4 games to 2.

In February we had the most juniors ever representing The MDGA in a Jack Newton Junior Golf tournament in Wagga. There was 9 junior spread out through all age groups. It was great to see them all supporting each other. We had some who finished really well.

In March our Juniors on the Move kicked off at Wodonga Golf Club. We had 9 events for the year with one more to be completed in December. We had around 20 juniors registered. On average there was 13 juniors at each event. In that we had 5 girls play which is great to see. Watching these juniors improve and enjoy golf is amazing to watch. A huge thank you to parents who have helped out and caddied for these aspiring juniors.

In April Thurgoona held the first ever Jack Newton Junior Tournament in The MDGA in The Murray Masters. With around 50 juniors travelling all over NSW and Vic. With The MDGA support well again by our juniors. With four Thurgoona juniors finishing with prizes. It will be back again next year so keep an eye out and pop down.

In June we kicked off our first ever junior open series at Yarrawonga. It was a cold wet day but there was 9 players who toughed it out. It was the first of five held in total. We have one to be played at Albury in December. We have had good numbers for these days. With some golfers off 5 or less plus some JOM players stepping up. We have had golfers from all over the area including Cobram, Echuca, Wodonga, Howlong and Albury.

In August The MDGA sent a Junior Pennant to Wagga City Golf Club to take on The RDGA in the first round of State Junior Pennant. Another heart stopper with 3 games each at the end to force a playoff hole. In the end Beau Davis got the district over the line. The team then travelled to Yass to take on Far South Coast. A huge effort but sadly we lost 5 games to 1. A huge thank you to all who went up and back for the day.

In October school holidays we held the first ever 3 day tournament at Albury, Howlong and Corowa. With both JOM and 18 holes being played over the three days. We had good numbers for the first attempt. With 14 players in the 18 holes and 5 in

the JOM section. A huge thank you to all too all clubs involved and hopefully something similar will be held next year.

We also had three juniors from Howlong play in the PSSA state finals in Sydney over three days. The three are part of our JOM and it's great to see them progressing.

The MDGA also brought back Junior Player of The Year which rewards the most consistent and who has played in various tournaments through 2022. The winner will be announced later in the year.

To finish off all these things couldn't go ahead without the support of Cade Webb (Golf NSW) , the golf clubs involved , parents and grandparents and of course the juniors for playing. It always great to hear how they played and see them smiling when finished. Let's build on what we have and see bigger and better things in 2023.
